Her research interests include evaluating the effect of socioeconomic disparities on prenatal detection of congenital heart defects, as well as an NIH funded study on device development in fetal electrocardiography.



Elissa Faro, PhD, MA
Research Assistant Professor of Internal Medicine General Internal Medicine, University of Iowa

Dr. Faro earned her undergraduate degree from Vassar College, then went on to receive her Master of Arts degrees in Anthropology and Archaeology, and a Doctoral degree in Classical Art and Archeology from the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. As an applied medical anthropologist, her research focuses on using quality improvement and implementation science to reduce health disparities and improve health equity. Currently, she is working with the HRSA-funded Iowa Maternal Quality Care Collaborative to improve maternal morbidity and mortality across the state of Iowa, and with Integrate Health, a non-profit working to reduce under five mortality and maternal health in Togo, Africa. Dr. Faro is also working together with colleagues at the Einstein-CUNY-Rockefeller CFAR on an NIMH-funded grant to reduce stigma around PrEP for young minority MSM.
